Michael Kenyon, President and CEO of the National Association of Charitable Gift Planning, shared that donors now more than ever are more active and interested in their estate planning process and leaving their legacy to an organization because of the environment and circumstances of COVID-19.

At the beginning of 2020, less than half of Americans even had a will and only 20% of those had named a nonprofit in their will. The data from a late-2020 survery showcased that ²/₃ of nonprofits were hearing from their donors about interest in planned giving and half of the donors were

interested in designating a gift to their organization.

85% of nonprofits showed an increase in planned gifts from the year before. 40% of donors are now saying they do not want to wait to give their

planned gifts but want to give them now. It is evident that the pandemic has had an impact on planned giving. Because of the

DIETARY

"I was able to purchase diabetic cookbooks, meal planners/portion plates, and calorie count booklets. These items/tools help diabetic patients and weight management patients follow their meal plans, give the patient ideas on foods to prepare and how to fit these foods into meal plans. The Calorie Count booklet is a resource of foods that can also aid the patient with fitting different foods into their meal plans. RADIOLOGY

In radiology, we use chairs for patient positioning on a daily basis for those who are unable to stand on their own. This helps relieve the stress on a tech's body from holding patients up and limits radiation exposure to everyone involved. These new chairs are an upgrade from our old ones. They are easier to clean, lighter weight, and easier to position. They are also wider and have a weight limit of 400 pounds, which makes them more accommodating to a larger variety of patients. We have already made good use of these new chairs and both patients and employees are greatly appreciative of this mini grant.

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OUTPATIENT INFUSION TREATMENT AVAILABLE AT WNH (+ A BIG THANK YOU)

Laura Frazier, BSN, RN-BC, WNH CNO, would like to give a big thank you to **Dr. Dennett** who asked if we (the hospital) would be thinking of offering this treatment at the hospital, essentially getting the ball rolling on making the treatment option available to local COVID patients. It is thanks to him as well as **Barb Humpert, Kelle Thompson,** and **Todd Wells** that we were able to get this process started. Thank you to all involved in this great team effort to provide quality care for our patients!

Since December, William Newton Hospital has been administering bamlanivimab, a monoclonal antibody treatment for COVID-19 on an outpatient basis. Some of the success witnessed by hospital staff include reduced severity of symptoms, fewer or shorter hospital stays and less oxygen demands.

"This treatment has helped COVID-19 patients at risk for developing more severe symptoms improve sooner and be less likely to be admitted to the hospital," said William Newton Hospital Chief Nursing Officer Laura Frazier, BSN, RN-BC. "There is no doubt in my mind this therapy has saved lives."

What is PAD?

Peripheral Arterial Disease (PAD) is a common disease in which narrowed arteries reduce blood flow to your limbs. This occurs when extra cholesterol and other fats build up in the arteries that supply blood to your limbs. The majority of people suffering from PAD experience difficulty walking as fast or as far as they could before PAD. In the early stages, many people do not experience symptoms, which is why early detection is so important. Once symptoms appear, the disease may have already progressed significantly.

Symptoms:

- Painful leg cramping
- Numbness, weakness or heaviness in the legs
- Burning or aching in feet and toes
- Cooling of skin on legs or feet
- Loss of hair on legs or feet
- Foot sores or foot ulcers

Why do I need a PAD Test?

Since the majority of PAD cases go undetected and many people with PAD do not even experience symptoms-at least in the early stages-a simple, non-invasive test can assist your doctor in assessing the possible presence of PAD. Early detection of PAD is critical for preserving access to a variety of treatment options that can help restore and sustain blood flow.
