Why we agreed to co-chair the William Newton Memorial Foundation Campaign

PAULA RADCLIFF

In 1974, I married Kent Radcliff and moved from Wichita to a cattle ranch near Dexter. At that time, my husband as well

as his father, Byron, served on the Snyder Foundation Board. I was asked to serve on the Snyder Foundation Ladies Auxiliary. Our only fundraising project was operating a food booth at the Blue Grass Festival and the Cowley County Fair. I was President of the Auxiliary in 1978 and remained an active member until our Auxiliary booth was lost during a flood at the fairgrounds. My husband remained an active board member until his death in 2016.

Living on a cattle ranch with four children, ranch hands and an accident prone husband made me realize I would not know how to respond to an emergency or injuries. It is a twenty minute drive to Winfield for medical care. I decided to enroll in the Emergency Medical Technician classes in 1980 at Cowley County Community College and received my certification in January of 1981. I served as a first responder in our area, joined the Winfield Area Emergency Medical Service Reserves and worked part time when needed. I served for twenty-five years and found it so rewarding to be a part of the WNH health care team.

In June of 2017, I was asked to serve on the Steering Committee to prepare for the strategy of the new campaign. I was honored to serve. During the course of those meetings, I became aware of the conservative growth of the hospital facility and the expanded services of health care offered over the forty-three years I have lived in Cowley County. I was aware of the services since I worked there but thought all rural hospitals were on the same path. WNH had the foresight many years ago to realize good medical care is the life-blood

of our community. They have continued to increase and improve the medical staff and upgrade the hospital facility.

The numbers of patients using WNH has greatly increased over the past ten years. Much of the growth includes Winfield, Cowley County residents and many patients from the adjacent counties. The numbers were enlightening.

Rural counties have a genuine need for quality medical care in order to maintain and grow their communities. The addition of a new Surgical Center and Emergency Room facilities will greatly enhance the quality of care given to our generation of patients as well as many which we have yet to meet.

I am excited, dedicated and honored to serve as Co-Chair of the Campaign.



STEVE MCSPADDEN

My family has a long history of involvement with WNH: My grandfather, AY Wells, was a

surgeon at our hospital, I was born at WNH, my father retired from the hospital board at age 75 after 25 years of service, our three boys were born here and I am in my 16th year of service on the board. Through this long involvement I have seen and experienced first hand the many benefits and joys of our strong community hospital. Patients and their families are well served without the burden of traveling to Wichita for cancer treatment, wound care including hyperbaric treatment, surgeries of many different types, emergency care is just minutes away, occupational therapy and many other inpatient and outpatient services are all performed by local caring people. In order to maintain and grow the services provided, substantial building improvements are badly needed. Examples include: an expanded surgical suite, space for a proposed cath lab and space for the constantly growing demand for emergency services.

Today community hospitals, including ours, have to remain focused daily to meet the economic challenges of providing quality comprehensive health care. Financial assistance is needed to offset the costs of these improvements. WNH has received no tax support for many years.

I have gladly agreed to serve as co-chair of the campaign to help insure that WNH will be well positioned going forward to continue serving the greater Winfield community in the years to come.
