We are quickly coming up on year 4 of serving the community in our Cardiac Catheterization Lab. We have seen over 670 patients and completed over 1,000 procedures since opening. Our newest procedure is called a transesophageal echocardiogram (TEE). The TEE uses high-frequency sound waves (ultrasound) to examine structures of the heart. We've done 39 of these so far this year. Thank you for your continued support!
